FAQs on the New Ministry Plan

For the last six months we have been hearing of planning a new ministry at our church. Here are some information on the probable questions regarding this ministry.

What exactly the purpose of this new ministry?

Though we are one of the nicest churches in the city, a close knit family engaged in caring, loving and serving ministry, we also face challenges on growing or even sustaining the membership. Some folks from our church, therefore, are intentionally praying & planning programs that could attract younger families to Christ and to the church; this is being done with the support of our church leadership and the Conference.

Would this new ministry change the existing pattern of worship that we have been having?

The new ministry of inviting millennials into church would start separately as small groups gathering for prayer and friendship, building relationship, connecting lives to Christ and eventually hoping to turn that into a body of worship on regular basis, probably as a second service. It would not replace the present worship service at all; instead, this becomes our church's new ministry to unchurched people.

Who will finance this new project?

Remembering how our ancestors have invested sacrificially for making this church available for us for our spiritual edification, nurture & growth, it should be our obligation to similarly invest on bringing unchurched families of our city and neighborhood to Christ. Realizing our financial constraints, the Conference has stepped up to help out with meeting major expenses that would occur while starting new worship service (including hiring worship leader and so on). Conference assured us that it would support this ministry for three years with the hope that the new group of worshippers would take responsibility of continuing the ministry by being part of the church administration.

Why can't the unchurched people be invited to the existing church service instead of starting a new ministry?

Absolutely we can do so; and are we not doing so always? But unfortunately, people don't want to come to church; this includes a few of our own folks including bringing children to Sunday school. Every year we have been losing a few individuals/families from the church roll as well. Knowing this well, a new attempt is prayerfully being tried with implementing a new strategy with the hope that it would draw younger families to Christ.

Would this new ministry be run separately & managed under independent administration?

Since this plan is being done by our church as our church's ministry, there would be no question of expecting a separate administration. As this ministry progresses eventually (step by step with small groups, programs etc) and the new ministry emerges successfully, we all will greatly rejoice with thankfulness to God for the opportunity that has been given to us to grow this ministry. Although we might worship separately as two services, this new ministry belongs to us and we continue as one church or a church within the church.

I, therefore, invite us to joyously participate in this sacred work of reaching out to the unreached and uphold in prayers our church group that has been diligently working on this difficult task. Remember, this is our mission to the unreached and let us humble ourselves before God and pray that God's Spirit might powerfully work in this effort by bringing many people to Christ.

SHARED MINISTRIES PROPOSED 2016 BUDGET

There are many ways to "Live the Fruit of the Spirit," but one of the most significant ways we share in ministry together is through the financial support of every congregation and every local church. The faithful commitment of United Methodists across our Conference guarantees that we are able to "make disciples of Jesus Christ" who join together to transform the world.

Each church is apportioned a share in the overall financial support of our connectional ministries and missions. But how is this money actually used? What benefit and value do we receive for the gifts we give? Facts and figures only reflect a small portion of the story. Here is a brief overview of the many exciting ministries and faithful missions we share in together as the Wisconsin Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church.

Congregational Revitalization, New Ministries, & Mission Churches

30% for Congregational Revitalization, New Ministries, and Mission Churches

Approximately 30% of our total budget (\$2.1 million) is dedicated to congregational revitalization, the launch and support of new ministries and churches, and the direct assistance of mission churches (those vital ministries that are currently not self-sustaining). Special focus on our racial and ethnic ministries and circuits is also funded through our giving. Training and learning opportunities are provided, as well as collaborative ministry opportunities beyond the capacity of most local churches.

25% for Global and National Connectional Ministries

Twenty-five percent of our budget (\$1.7 million) is designated to support the global and national connectional ministries of our denomination. World Service Fund, Ministerial Education, Africa University, Black College Fund, the Episcopal Fund and the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund all provide vital ministries around the world. Only about 1.5% goes to the General Administration Fund. The remainder is used to support our worldwide connectional ministries.

23% for Wisconsin Connectional Ministries

Twenty-three percent (\$1.6 million) stays within our Conference to fund our connectional ministries in Wisconsin. Our camps, our mission projects locally and globally, our campus ministries, our health and welfare ministries, and dozens more are kept healthy and strong through the giving of our local congregations. Salary and support for Conference staff and leadership are an essential part of our shared connectional ministry. We have invested staff, energy, and resources to improving our communication ministries at all levels.

for Clergy and Laity Leadership Development

Ten percent of our budget (\$725,000) is dedicated to the ongoing cultivation and improvement of clergy and laity leadership within the Conference. This is a real investment, both in the short-term and for our future. Our Boards of Ordained and Lay Ministry work diligently to make sure that we have the type of leadership and the right mix of gifts and skills to allow us to do effective ministry within the Conference and around the world.

6% for Local Congregations

Approximately 6% of our giving (\$382,000) comes directly back to local congregations through consultation, training, partnerships, and networking. We support each other in ministry, and the Conference works with circuits and local churches to meet as many individual needs as possible.

6% for Administrative Costs

Another 6% of our giving (\$391,000) underwrites the administrative and overhead costs needed to run any organization. The Conference is making great strides to be good stewards of the resources we have, to eliminate or reduce waste, and to maximize the impact of what we use.

DOTTOM LINE: 94% OF THE BUDGET METHODIST MISSION

We have not been able to fund our budget fully for a number of years. This is more than an inconvenience, it is a tragedy. As we receive less, we are able to do less. For the last several years, Wisconsin paid its General Church Apportionments at less than 100%--after two decades of paying it in full. For years, we have been forced to reduce, cut, or eliminate ministries and programs as apportionment giving decreased from our churches. Together, we can return to 100%. If we Imagine Wisconsin Anew, and think in terms of abundance, and not scarcity, we can do it. God will bless our efforts and we will do great things.



Our challenge is not merely to reach 100%, but to think greater. What could we do if we reached 105%? 110%? What new opportunities could we share in together to witness to God's greatness in our Conference and our world? We shouldn't strive to simply "pay our bills." We want to make a statement: we believe God is ready to do amazing things through the faithful giving of the Wisconsin Annual Conference. Join us this year as we Imagine Wisconsin Anew!

LifeLine Screening July 17, 2015

Life Line Screening will be here at our church offering safe, painless, non-invasive preventive health screenings that are typically not a part of a routine physical. Five screenings will be offered that scan arteries which is a leading cause of stroke; abdominal aorta aneurysms which can lead to a ruptured aorta; hardening of the arteries in the legs which is a strong predictior of heart disease; atrial fibrillation or irregular heart beat which is closely tied to stroke risk; and a bone density screening for men and women, used to assess the risk of osteoporosis. Register for a Wellness Package which includes 4 vascular tests and osteoporosis screening from \$149 (\$139 with our member discount). All five screenings take 60-90 minutes to complete. MISSIONS WORK AREA

Dear Supporting Churches,

It is so heartening to know that you are praying for and supporting our work at Mujila Falls Agriculture Centre.

Thanks for your continuing support of my Salary as a UMC Missionary. Please also remember that we need Project support to keep me busy at Mujila Falls Agriculture Centre. We are in the Dry Season here and that means building. We are rebuilding a calf barn, putting in milking stalls, putting up a permanent water tower to improve water to our 70 head of cattle, 65 goats and 60 sheep as well as 2500 chickens and our worker house.

We have just taken delivery of a 75 HP John Deere and mower. We used it to bring in our forage crop in the last two weeks and to make silage to get our herd through the six month long dry season. We will soon take delivery of a new Disc Harrow so we can be ready to plant maize and soybeans in November.

We are also looking for donations to buy layer cages for our 1,200 new chickens. That will cost us about \$500 dollars.
